It seems like over the past month we have had almost every type of weather here in Cedar City! From beautiful and sunny days to snow and cold windy days, as usual, you can never predict what the weather will do around this time of the year! However, as we get closer to “Spring” (at least on the calendar) I want to remind everyone that with the warmer weather

the many “Festival City” events will be getting into full swing. As it is always best to put your best side forward when guests visit, please take advantage of our annual City Spring Clean-Up by getting your property all tidied up and looking its very best. This is a great opportunity to have our City crews haul away the debris from a long winter as we all get ready for another beautiful Cedar City spring, summer, and fall. Even with our crazy weather things around town are not slowing down! This past month I was able to present the first annual “State of the City Address” at the Chamber of Commerce breakfast, and we’ve started the annual budget process which will lead to the final City Budget being adopted in June. As we move through the budget process I will provide status updates and information about the public budget hearings.

On January 28th, Corporal Kirk Lovell and his K-9, Max, were summoned to assist the Utah Highway Patrol on a traffic stop on I-15 in

Cedar City. K-9 Max alerted to illegal narcotics in the vehicle and it was discovered that five pounds of cocaine and one pound of powder ecstasy (with a street value of more than \$350,000!) were concealed inside the vehicle. K-9 Max is a 3-year-old Belgian Malinois who completed his training in June of 2018, and immediately began working with Corporal Lovell. This is his first large drug find. The hard work and dedication demonstrated by Corporal Lovell and K-9 Max helped to remove these dangerous drugs from the streets. Great job!

Silicon Slopes Cedar City & Tech-Up will be co-hosting a luncheon on March 8th that will highlight Women and Technology in Southern Utah. There will be several guest speakers detailing the strides being made in this area, and identifying programs that are in place to help girls feel confident entering jobs that relate to technology. 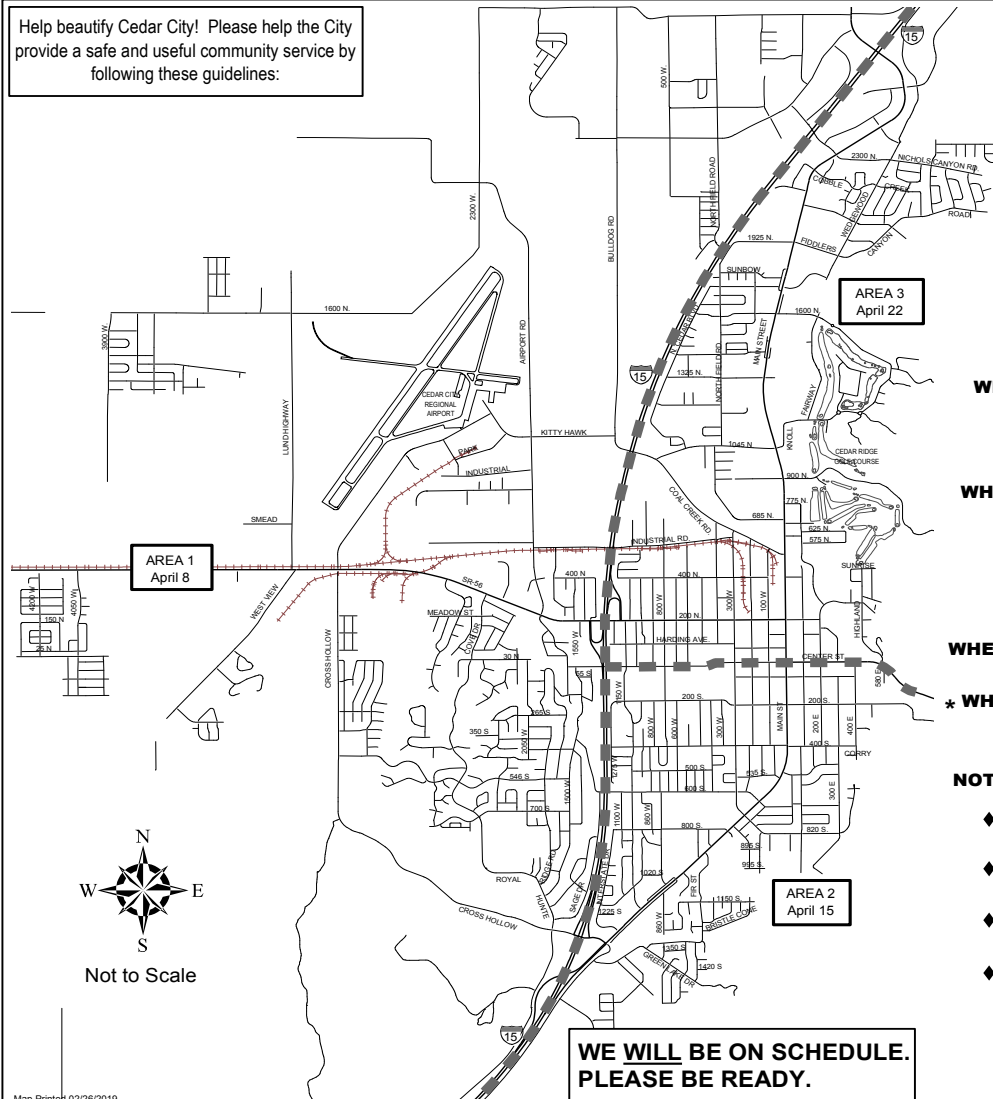
Jimmy Roden honored

CEDAR CITY SPRING CLEAN-UP 2019

*** Spring Clean-up map has changed ***

(Please note new dates, area number rotation and what are acceptable materials that will be picked-up.)

WHO: This service is provided to Cedar City Residents, except those living in a Planned Unit Development (PUD). **This is not for Commercial or Industrial Properties.**

WHEN: Cedar Collection crews will begin in each area on a Monday. Crews will NOT come on Friday, Saturday or Sunday, or return to streets that have been completed. Have your debris out on the curb by 7:00 A.M. the day your area is scheduled for clean-up (See Map). **Do not put debris out more than one week before your clean-up dates.**

WHERE: Debris must be in front of the curb in the street. City crews will not load debris if it is piled on private property.

*** WHAT:** Brush, branches, clippings, leaves, grass, untreated wood, including pallets and crates. Asphalt, dirt, rocks & concrete. Tires, 4 or less per pile (No Rim's). No Furniture or Appliances

- NOTES:**
- ◆ Please keep vehicles off street during your scheduled week and the following week so that city crews can sweep the street.
 - ◆ A maximum of one 10 wheeler dump truck load will be picked up at any one residence.
 - ◆ Cedar City citizens are encouraged to report illegal or improper dumping of materials.
 - ◆ **All unacceptable piles will not be picked up and must be removed from the street.**

AIRPORT: We would like to welcome Nick Holt as our new Cedar City Regional Airport Manager. Nick has over 15 years of experience in aviation. He graduated from Utah Valley University with a Bachelor's Degree in Aviation Management. Nick holds a commercial pilot license and is a Certified Flight Instructor and Certified Flight Instructor - Instrument. Nick has spent the last 8 years in St. George as the Assistant to the Operations Supervisor/Security Coordinator. We are excited to have Nick in Cedar City managing our Airport.

WASTEWATER: The Wastewater Collection Division will be starting its annual sewer line flushing in March, 2019. Each year our wastewater crew cleans one-fourth of the sewer lines in the City. This year the lines scheduled for cleaning are east of the freeway from Center Street north to the City limits. The City does not clean sewer lines in Planned Unit Developments (PUDs.) We flush the sewer lines to remove debris such as rocks, roots, silt, sand, and grease that has accumulated in the sewer pipes. If debris is allowed to build up, the blockage will reduce the capacity of the pipe and can eventually result in sewage overflow into streets, basements, and yards. While flushing sewer lines, the pressure can create a vacuum and pressures that release air back through the toilet. During cleaning you may see bubbling in the toilet or hear strange noises coming from the bowl. The sewer lines in your homes are designed to vent these vacuums and pressures before they enter the home. The City takes care to use the least amount of pressure required to clean lines; however, some homes may not be properly vented, causing toilets to gurgle. Residents should keep their toilet lids down while the lines in their area are being flushed to avoid any back spray or water splashing out of the toilet. If you have an odor coming out of your drains, just run some water down the drain to refill the S-bend, sometimes called a P-trap, with water. STREETS: The Street Division will begin Spring Clean-Up in April 2019. (Please refer to the map on the opposite page). This year crews will begin collection as follows:

- Area 1: west of I-15, April 8th, 2019
- Area 2: south of Center Street and east of I-15 on April 15th, 2019
- Area 3: north of Center Street and east of I-15 on April 22nd, 2019

Crews will begin collection in each area on a Monday. Crews WILL NOT come on Friday, Saturday, or Sunday and WILL NOT return to streets that have already been completed.

Please have your debris out on the curb by 7 a.m. on the Monday your area is scheduled for the clean-up to begin. Please do not put debris out more than one week before your scheduled clean-up dates. A maximum of one (1) 10-wheeler dump truck load will be picked up at any one residence.

Debris must be in front of the curb in the street. City crews will not load debris if it is piled on private property. City crews will pick up brush, branches, clippings, leaves, grass, untreated wood including pallets and crates, asphalt, dirt rocks and concrete. Tires – 4 or less per pile (NO rims.)

*****We will NOT pick up furniture or appliances or electronics. All unacceptable piles will not be picked up and must be removed from the street by those who placed it there*****

This service is provided to Cedar City residents, except those living in a Planned Unit Development (PUD), and is not for commercial or industrial properties. Please keep vehicles off the street during your scheduled week and the following week so that City crews can sweep the street.
